Self Assessment



If you are self-employed you will have to do a tax return to let HMRC know how much you have earned

You will not need to do so if you earned less than £1000 in the year.

This is so that they can work out how much tax you owe.

To do the tax return you have to know how much you have earned.

You can also reduce what you owe by claiming for some of the costs of running your self-employment.

The return will also include any other income you had in the tax year. So if you had a part time job in same year as the self-employment, this will need to be included on the return.

If you do have to do a tax return do not ignore it or you will be charged penalties that can mount up every day.

It is much better to ring HMRC or TaxAid to sort any problems. To see whether you have to do a tax return go to:

Employed or Self-Employed?

What is the difference in how you get paid if you are an employee or self-employed?



If you are an employee your tax is deducted from your payslip every month you do not have to do anything.

If you are self Employed this means that you work for yourself, you could be a sole-trader or be a partner in a partnership.

You still need to pay tax, but you are responsible for telling HMRC what you earn so that your tax can be calculated.

You report your earnings through Self-Assessment.

If you work in construction, you will usually be a subcontractor, and even though your contractor deducts tax from the payments they make to you, you are still self-employed, and have to complete a self-assessment tax return.

There are some other ways to get paid for work done, like work through an umbrella company, or your own company.

Make sure you pay the right tax for your job

PAYE Codes



If you are employed your employer will pay the tax you owe before you receive your wage using your PAYE code.

If you are on the wrong PAYE code HMRC will usually correct it during the year and your net pay will change.

However sometimes if the code isn't changed during the year you will be sent a bill and it may be quite a lot which can be a surprise and hard to manage if it is unexpected.

You are more likely to be on the wrong code if you have more than one job or change jobs a lot.

Keeping records

If you are self-employed and have to do a tax return you have to keep a record of what you have earned and what you have spent on your business.



The invoices you send to customers are a good way to keep a record of your earnings.

If you work in construction, you will receive a certificate showing how much tax the main contractor has paid on your wages.

You can claim relief from some of your tax if you have spent on some things to support your business.

You need to prove you have spent this money on your business with receipts.

Not everything can be claimed.
